

Tom Celani

Tom Celani became President of Action Distributing Company, Inc. at age 26. He proceeded to grow Action into one of the largest Miller distributorships in the country with an annual growth rate of more than 7 percent. Tom sold Action in 1999 in connection with his Michigan Gaming Control Board licensing for his ownership of Motor City Casino, as state law prohibits an individual from holding a beer distribution license and a retail liquor license concurrently.

Tom's entry into the gaming industry came in 1988 when he co-founded Sodak Gaming, Inc along with two other individuals. Tom grew Sodak from a small company distributing gaming devices to Indian tribes in South Dakota to a public company with more than \$150 million in annual revenues. Tom served as a member of the Sodak Board of Directors through the summer of 1998, when IGT purchased all outstanding shares of Sodak.

In 1995 Tom commenced the development of the Little River Casino Resort for the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians. Tom assisted the Little River Band in the entire development and financing process for their casino and managed the casino resort through September 2004. Today, Little River Casino consists of a 300,000 square foot facility with more than 1,300 slot machines, 35 table games, 300 hotel rooms and three dining experiences. Annual revenues now exceed \$130 million.

Tom spearheaded the 1996 Michigan state-wide voter referendum that led to casino gaming in Detroit. Tom's group was selected as one of the three companies to receive a casino license and Motor City Casino opened to the public in December of 1999. From 1999 to 2005, Tom was an owner and member of the Management Committee of Motor City Casino, which generated more than \$400 million in revenue annually and employed more than 2,400 people, 50 percent of whom were Detroit residents. Tom sold his interest in Motor City in April 2005 in connection with the MGM Mandalay Bay merger.

In April, 2001 Tom commenced development of the Rolling Hills Casino for the Paskenta Band of Nomlaki Indians in Corning, California. Once construction began, over the next 12 months Tom assisted the Paskenta Band of Nomlaki Indians in the development and financing of their \$40 million casino project. In July 2002, Rolling Hills Casino opened to the public with a 60,000 square foot facility, 650 slot machines, 12 table games, a steakhouse, and a 300-person buffet. Since that time, the Tribe has expanded the casino and added two hotels and a hunting lodge.

In December 2005, Tom acquired, through his company, Luna Gaming – Red Dolly, 100 percent of the shares of Red Dolly, Inc. which operates the Red Dolly Casino in Black Hawk, Colorado which is 40 miles outside of Denver. Red Dolly Casino is the oldest operating casino in Colorado and has many of the newest slot machines as well as the best family style food in the town of Black Hawk.

Tom is also working with the Upper Lake Band of Pomo Indians in Northern California. Tom will assist the Upper Lake Band of Pomo Indians in financing, constructing and managing their casino to be located in Lake County, California. The Upper Lake casino will have 350 slot machines and two dining experiences.

Working with the Kiowa Tribe, Tom recently opened the \$70 million dollar Kiowa Casino located in Randlett, Oklahoma just north of the Texas/Oklahoma boarder. Kiowa Casino is a state of the art casino which operates more than 1,000 ticket-in ticket-out slot machines and 20 table games. Kiowa Casino is also equipped with high-end exclusive steak house, a cutting edge sports bar and a top notch buffet.

In January of 2007 Tom took over management of the historic Cal Neva Casino located on the shores of Lake Tahoe in Crystal Bay, Nevada. The Cal Neva Casino is the oldest active gaming license in the State of Nevada. The casino was once owned by Frank Sinatra and frequented by the Rat Pack as well as Marilyn Monroe. A Portion of the tunnel that Sinatra used to use to escape the crowds and travel from the Nevada side to the California side still exists today.

In addition to his gaming projects, Tom has been integral in the development of a variety of other real estate development projects including the Timbers at Snowmass, a \$100 million resort project in Aspen, Colorado. The Timbers is located along the slopes of Snowmass, Colorado and provides various recreational and cultural experiences among breath-taking surroundings. All phases of the Resort have been completed including townhouses and the main lodge, employee housing and two additional residential buildings.

Tom owns and operates the Luna Building, an 80,000-square-foot retail development in the Main Street District of Novi, Michigan. The Luna Building houses Luna Entertainment's corporate offices. Other tenants include The Post Bar and Gus O'Connor's, an authentic Irish pub, opened in the fall of 2003. The building also houses The Better Health Store, a premier health food store chain and Lifestyles, a high end hot tub and patio furniture store.

Tom has also invested heavily in the Arizona real estate market and opened a Luna office in Mesa, Arizona. In total, Tom is involved in 10 separate real estate projects in Arizona. Three of Tom's projects involve large tracts of land in Pinal County, Arizona. The three other projects are residential and commercial infill developments. Four other projects are managed by Luna Land Ventures, a company Tom formed exclusively for the acquisition and development of land in and around Phoenix. In total, Luna Land Ventures, Tom and his development partners will sell more than 10,000 acres of vacant land and construct more than 700 residential condominiums and develop more than 30 acres of commercial development. All of this development is projected to occur by 2011.

Tom also operates two retail motorcycle dealerships. The first is Motor City Harley-Davidson, the number one Harley dealership in the Midwest and winner of Harley's prestige BAR and SHEILD award. Motor City Harley-Davidson is one of Harley's most exciting facilities with more than 65,000 square feet located in Farmington

Hills, Michigan. Motor City Harley-Davidson is the 10th largest Harley Davidson dealership in the United States out of 650 dealerships by volume. The Motor City Harley-Davidson HOG Chapter has more than 1,200 members and is one of the largest Chapters in Michigan.

Tom's second motorcycle dealership is Motor City Power Sports. In 2006 Tom acquired Anderson Sales and Service, located in Bloomfield Hills, which was at that time one of the largest power sports dealerships in Michigan, and one of the top branded dealerships in the United States. Tom renamed the dealership Motor City Power Sports and has improved upon the long history of success the dealership enjoyed. Motor City Power Sports sells motorcycles, jet skis, dirt bikes and snowmobiles from seven of the top manufacturers, including Honda, Yamaha, Kawasaki and Bombardier.

Tom is also an owner of MJR Theaters. MJR Theaters has seven locations in Michigan including the newest addition to the MJR Theater Collection, Partridge Creek Cinema 14.

With Tom's rich Italian family traditions and keen interest in wine and winemaking, it is no surprise that in 2005 he fell in love with a Napa Valley Tuscan-style estate now called Celani Family Vineyards. Celani Family Vineyards includes 17 acres of grapes and 120 olive trees. In 2005 Tom also began producing wine. As the proprietor of the Celani Family Vineyards, Tom's goal is to make the best wine in the world....period. "This is about quality, not quantity." Tom hired all star winemaker Mark Herold, Wine Spectator's Rising Star of Napa Valley. Ardore, which means passion in Italian, is a fitting name for his high-end Cabernet which reflects his approach to business and life. Celani Family Vineyards has also released a 2005 cabernet and a 2006 chardonnay.
